Conference Attendee Profile

Introduction	WIFLE is an outgrowth of an interagency committee formed by the Department of Treasury and the Department of Justice in 1982. In June 1999, WIFLE was established as a non-profit organization.
Your Opportunity	As an exhibitor at the 2003 Conference, you will have the opportunity to reach a nationwide audience of culturally diverse, professional women and men.
What do they do?	Attendees are mainly Federal law enforcement officers, criminal investigators, special agents, forensics specialists, inspectors, managers, attorneys and administrators. Many are in positions authorized by Congress to carry firearms.
Who are they?	Most of the registrants are women who are well educated, healthy, and physically fit. They range from 21-57 years of age with a typical income ranging from \$40,000 to \$100,000 per annum. Agency executives and high level management officials, empowered to make procurement decisions, are also participants.
Where are they?	Registrants attend from throughout the United States. Some agents from foreign posts of duty also attend. The attendees represent more than 60 Federal law enforcement agencies.
How many?	Over 900 registrants and guests are expected to attend the 2003 Conference.
